



There seems to be so much disunity in the World, and it would be good to think that when one looked at the Church we would find peace and understanding amongst God's people. Yet sadly this is not always the case, especially in the Church of England at present; often we bring our feelings of discord with us when we come to worship which can only act in a negative way, as a barrier to us reaching out to others, and to The Lord.

Psalm 133 reminds us how good it is when all is well with the world.

"How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity! It is like the precious oil on the head, running down upon the beard, on the beard of Aaron, running down over the collar of his robes"

Our World is certainly a different place at the moment, one that is still fearful and unsure in so many ways, not least because of what the future may hold for us. When we act in unloving ways to one another, then all we do is reflect the world about us, but when we follow Christ with our hearts and minds there is also love, and that should be the driving force. The same love that St Paul wrote about:

1 Corinthians 13:4-5

# Mothering Sunday: 4th Sunday in Lent

There is an old Jewish saying: *God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers.* 

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16<sup>th</sup> century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church. During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live -in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families - which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday has changed and in many ways now resembles the American Mother's Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.

# All in the month of March

It was:

170 years ago, on the 31st March 1855, Charlotte Bronte, the reclusive Yorkshire novelist and author of *Jane Eyre*, died on this day.

175 years ago, on 5th March 1850 that the Britannia Bridge linking Anglesey and mainland Wales across the Menai Strait was officially opened. Designed and built by railway engineer Robert Stephenson, it had to be replaced after a disastrous fire in 1970.

150 years ago, on 7<sup>th</sup> March 1875 that the French composer Maurice Ravel was born. Best known for *Bolero*, which Torvel and Dean used for to win Olympic gold.

125 years ago, on 28th March 1900 that the British archaeologist Arthur Evans began excavating the ancient city of Knossos, capital of the Minoan civilisation, in Heraklion, Crete. Knossos is regarded as the oldest city in Europe. It was abandoned (unknown reasons) more than 3,000 years ago.

100 years ago, on 21st March 1925 that Murrayfield Stadium in Edinburgh was officially opened.

90 years ago, on 16th March 1935 that driving tests were first introduced in Britain. Three days later, on 19th March, a speed limit of 30 mph in built-up areas was also introduced, under the Road Traffic Act of 1934.

85 years ago in 1940 the English actress Vivien Leigh won an Oscar for her performance as Scarlett O'Hara in the film Gone with the Wind.

80 years ago, on 24<sup>th</sup> March 1945 that Operation Varsity took place in Wesel, Germany. The USA, Britain and Canada carried out the largest single-day airborne landing operation in history, involving more than 16,000 paratroopers and thousands of aircraft. Allied victory.

70 years ago, on 11<sup>th</sup> March 1955 that Sir Alexander Fleming, Scottish bacteriologist died. Joint winner of the 1945 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for discovering penicillin

60 years ago, on 8th March 1965 that the first US troops arrived in Vietnam. This marked the beginning of the USA's main involvement in the war.

Also 60 years ago, on 18th March 1965 that Soviet cosmonaut Aleksei Leonov became the first person ever to make a spacewalk.

50 years ago, on 26th March 1975 that the Biological Weapons Convention came into effect. This multilateral disarmament treaty banned the development, production and stockpiling of all biological and toxin weapons.

40 years ago, on 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1985 that British miners voted to return to work after a year-long strike over pit closures and job losses.

30 years ago, on 2<sup>nd</sup> March 1995 that the 'rogue trader' Nick Leeson was arrested for his role in the collapse of Barings, Britain's oldest merchant bank. Four days later, on 6<sup>th</sup> March, the Dutch bank ING purchased Barings, for the nominal price of £1.

# HERBERT PROTOCOL

Might the HERBERT PROTOCOL help you and your family. Are you caring for someone with dementia / Alzheimer's. The Herbert Protocol has been developed as a resource to provide quick access to relevant information about a vulnerable individual that might go missing. The idea is for the carer / relatives to fill in a protocol booklet. The booklet askes, a number of questions that the police and emergency services would want to know when looking for a vulnerable person. The booklet also requests an up-to-date photo of the vulnerable person.

The carer / relative then retains the protocol, up until a time when it might be needed. If the person you care for goes missing, when you report this to police make them aware that you have a Hebert Protocol already in place. We can then collect the booklet from you and use the information you have provided to support us in trying to find the vulnerable person as quickly as possible.

# The Birds in Your Garden



# Collective Nouns

Watching a flock of Blue Tits whizzing around my garden led me to wonder what the collective noun for such a flock might be – it seems that it is a dissimulation. Could that be because they don't really stay as a close flock, but shoot off in all directions? It took a bit of finding, and whilst wandering through several lists of collective nouns I came across quite a few I did not know, many which I did, and a few totally contrived ones, of which a Reliant of Robins was the worst!

The reasoning behind some of the names was fairly obvious – a charm of Goldfinches, a clattering of jackdaws, a mischief of Magpies, an exaltation of larks, and a parliament of owls for example, but others rather less so. You could probably add a host or a quarrel of sparrows to this list.

Why a murder of crows, though? There seem to be several sinister sounding nouns for crows, such as murder, mob and horde, probably originating from medieval peasants' fears that these black corvids had been sent by the Devil or were witches in disguise.

Similarly, an unkindness of ravens could stem from the misguided 19<sup>th</sup> century belief that they were not the most caring of parents, sometimes expelling their young from their nests to fend for themselves, way before they were ready. I did see one reference to a constable of ravens too,

maybe because they resemble policemen looking for miscreants?

Perhaps not surprisingly, Blackbird flocks have several names too, all of which were new to me: - a cloud, a grackle, or a merle (which is French for a Blackbird.)

The origins of many of these collective nouns are lost in history, dating from medieval times, when there was a tradition of assigning descriptive and sometimes whimsical terms to groups of animals and birds. These terms were popularised through texts like *The Book* of Saint Albans, published in 1486. Some are named after particular habits, such as 'a descent of woodpeckers', possibly due to their penchant for dropping down from great heights on ants. 'A bellowing of bullfinches' is thought to come from the unusual thickness of their necks, and a "deceit" of lapwings because they pretend to be injured to divert predators away from their young.

And what about the best known collective noun, a murmuration? It is thought to have come from the Latin word 'murmurāre', to mutter or murmur. It is onomatopoeic, sounding like the noise it describes – in this case that created by the flutter of thousands of pairs of wings.

Finally, one of our smallest but noisiest garden birds is the Wren, whose (rare in my experience) flocks attract a couple of common nouns. The more descriptive is a chime of Wrens, which also celebrates their most charming

attribute – their song. So, the next time you hear their lively chirps and melodious tunes in your garden, remember, you are listening to a chime of Wrens! The other, which I can't think of a reason for, is a herd of Wrens....Why?

Be that as it may, I hope you enjoyed this bit of whimsy!

# Recipe - Parkin



This Recipe is reproduced from the All Saints Weston Recipe book, that was first printed 1st December 1956. 52 years later it was discovered by Reverend Marlene Wilkinson in her mothers possessions and reprinted again. She dedicated it to "Edith and all the other saints who made their Contributions"

> 68 years later we are sharing the recipes again. Thank you to the people of Weston for their recipes

Ingredients 1lb flour 1/2 lb Medium Oatmeal 1/2 lb butter 1/2lb sugar 1/4 lb Syrup (mix of treacle and golden syrup as an alternative) 2 teaspoons of ground ginger 2 teaspoons bi carbonate of soda 1teaspoon cream of tartar (mixed with 1/2 pint of milk) 1 egg

## Method

- Prepare a deep 8" baking tin
- Gently melt the butter, syrup

- and sugar together until dissolved
- Add the flour, ginger, baking powder, cream of tartar and the oatmeal into the mixture
- Add the beaten egg

Bake in a moderate oven (160 / 140 fan) for 50 minutes to an hour when the cake has a firm and slightly crusty top.

Cool in the tin and then wrap in more parchment, the cake will become stickier and softer the longer you leave it (up to two weeks)

# Gardeners Corner



I hope the weather will have warmed up a bit by the time you read this. February has been so cold and gloomy, only relieved by the snowdrops which have been gorgeous again this year! Not too late to split them up and replant – the best way to increase them.

If you are pruning dogwoods and willows, save some of the stems for supports around the garden and in pots, where they can be woven into decorative shapes. As spring advances, it is time to prune hydrangeas, but different cultivars need treating differently. The pointed paniculata and blowsy arborescens such as "Annabelle" need early spring pruning, as the plants produce flowers on this year's growth; cut right back to two buds. However, lacecaps and mopheads should be pruned a little later as new buds emerge, cutting back

to the first pair of healthy buds down below last year's flowers. Buddleias can be cut right back now and will benefit from a tonic of iron.

Watch out for slugs and snails – an evening slug hunt with a torch and sharp knife works wonders, as recommended by Nick Bailey from Gardeners' World!

If your sweet peas are now three or four inches tall, pinch out the tips as this will encourage the plants to grow side shoots to make more flowers. Later in the month, tomatoes can be sown in a warm place before putting them in the greenhouse. It's probably still too early in the north to sow veg outdoors, but again you can get ahead by sowing some in the greenhouse. Be patient, April will be a really busy time.
