

We have a unique message that Jesus longs for all his people to live in unity, to love and care for one another, not to be afraid to commit and to declare his Lordship in our lives.

News from Norwood Chapel

Dear Friends,

What a January we had! As I write this, the snow and ice haven't fully melted but the temperatures are hovering above 0 Celsius now, which is a step in the right direction. Tomorrow the highs will be well above freezing. Did you like the winter white snow (and ice!) that blanketed our area for a week? I truly enjoyed the sheer beauty of the snow, how it made our world look so clean and pure, and how it muffled sound. The silence after a snowfall is simply magical.

As much as I was enthralled by it, I was also frustrated by it. The ice made the roads, footpaths and even our driveway quite treacherous. We had to cancel in-person worship for two Sundays in a row due to the continuing presence of densely-packed snow and ice in the car parks and on certain non-gritted roads. Bottomline was that routines and transport were interrupted. New plans had to be made . . . or old ones cancelled altogether. We lived one day at a time with whether we could get out of our driveway with our car.

In a sense, we had to learn a different and temporary routine where we could no longer rely on the things that used to be certain. And the plans I had made for myself were sidelined because of other circumstances that cropped up. Have you ever had a moment when you realise you really aren't in control after all? If we're willing to pay attention, life has a way of teaching this lesson to us frequently. We can be so thick-headed, can't we?! What lessons can we learn when our senses of security and certainty are stripped away, and we look like the bare

our senses of security and certainty are stripped away, and we look like the bare branches of a tree during winter? How do we re-orient ourselves to what is most worthwhile?

In her book *A Midwinter God*, Christine Valters Paintner speaks about how our western culture "rarely acknowledges the value of being uncomfortable . . . we are forever seeking the next thing to make us feel good." She elaborates further: "By staying present to the discomfort of life, we grow in our resilience and our ability to recover from the deep wounds that life will offer us again and again. We grow in our compassion for ourselves . . . and others. We grow in our ability to experience that deep presence and peace (of God) in the midst of life's messiness and uncertainty." I must confess that dwelling in discomfort does not make me want to jump for joy. However, I sense there's great wisdom in being attune to our inner landscape (inner thoughts and emotions) and not rushing in to try fixing something we cannot fix. I think dwelling with the discomfort is worth exploring. I wonder what other lessons we can learn from this season of Winter. ons we can learn from this season of Winter.

All in the month of February

It was:

90 years ago, on 22nd February 1935 that US President Franklin D Roosevelt banned aircraft from flying over the White House because the noise kept him awake at night. The ban remains in place today, but mainly now for security reasons.

90 years ago, on 26th February 1935 that British radio engineer Robert Warson-Watt demonstrated a working radar system for the first time, in Daventry.

80 years ago, during February 1945 that Anne Frank died. The young Dutch Jewish diarist and Holocaust victim died in Bergen-Belsen concentration camp at the age of 15, probably from typhus.

Also 80 years ago, on 6th February 1945 that Bob Marley, the Jamaican reggae/ska/rock steady singer, songwriter was born. He became a musician and cultural icon (died

Also 80 years ago, on 13th to 15th February 1945 that the bombing of Dresden took place. The Allies carried out four massive bombing raids, completely destroying the inner city, and killing about 25,000 people.

Also 80 years ago, on 21st February 1945 that Eric Liddell, Scottish athlete, died. An Olympic gold medallist in 1924 (400 m), he had withdrawn from the 100m heat because it was held on a Sunday and entered the 400 m instead. The story is featured in the film Chariots of Fire. (Liddell died in a WWII internment camp in China, aged 43.)

70 years ago, from 24th February 1955 to March that Britain's Big Freeze took place. Deep snow and freezing temperatures caused havoc, with many places cut off. The RAF dropped food and medical supplies to affected areas, while thousands of sheep died from exposure.

65 years ago, on 8th February 1960 that the Hollywood Walk of Fame was established in Hollywood. It consists of more than 2,700 stars embedded in the pavement, that bear the names of notable figures from the entertainment industry.



The Birds in Your Garden



Bramblings

A recent article about Bramblings in the BTO's Garden BirdWatch newsletter made me look back at my garden records for the last dozen vears. I had one visit recorded! I thought there had been more memory plays tricks. That one sighting was in November 2021 when Storm Arwen saw a Met Office red weather-warning for wind along the northeast coast, one of the most powerful and damaging storms of the latest decade, which might have had something to do with its appearance.

I live in hope, and if we get some more prolonged snowy spells or lengthy hard frosts, we might see Bramblings forced into our gardens

The Brambling is a frequent winter visitor with a taste for beech mast (nuts), arriving in late autumn from Fennoscandia. They can sometimes be seen in large numbers, often forming mixed flocks with other finches, particularly Chaffinches. When they do come into our gardens they are typically found feeding on the ground, eating spilled seed from hanging feeders. That apart, their preference, is for beechmast, the small nuts produced by beech trees in widely varying quantities each year. Annual Brambling arrivals can range from 50,000 to 2 million birds when seeds are in short supply on the continent.

The availability of beech mast drives the migration patterns of many seed-eating birds. When it is plentiful, they tend not to migrate west in any

significant numbers. Records suggest an underlying pattern of masting every two years but in practice in England really heavy masts tend to happen between 5 and 12 years apart. The 'signal' for heavy masts was thought to be a combination of climatic factors, such as late spring frosts, or summer droughts, though recent research suggests greater warmth in the previous two springs and summers (growing seasons) may be the trigger.

The autumnal colour theme of their plumage, rusty reds and oranges, mingling with black and white, provides camouflage when foraging among the fallen leaves. As with other finches, males are bolder in their colouration. They can be confused with Chaffinches but tend to be slightly larger on average and when in mixed flocks their different colour patterns are very evident. In both sexes, the breast and shoulder area is a rich, rusty orange colour (brighter and : more extensive in males), compared to the reddish breast of a male chaffinch and the buff-grey of a female chaffinch. and the buff-grey of a female chaffinch. In winter, both male and female bramblings have a yellow bill, whereas chaffinches have a grey bill. In flight Bramblings are distinguishable by their white rumps particularly in flocks.

Their nasal 'che-eep' call, with a notable rise in pitch, often gives away their presence, but in general their contact calls are quieter than those of the Chaffinch.

It's a good example of "the more you

look, the more you see". Keep your binoculars handy and you never know!

Gardeners Corner

As I write this in January, gardens are still waterlogged after such a wet few months and it has been impossible to get on the ground. Hopefully by the time you read this, things will have dried out a bit. Get started on the veg patch, tidying up and removing the old plants that were left and neglected over the winter. Apply a good mulch of well rotted manure, garden compost or spent mushroom compost to a depth of 4 or 5 inches and not just on the kitchen garden! Flower beds should also be mulched to provide protection and nutrients needed for all that growth that will soon begin.

Autumn fruiting raspberries should be pruned right down to ground level and if you haven't already done so, it is not too late to attend to summer raspberries by cutting out the old shoots and tying in the new ones, which can also be cut down to about 4 feet. While you are on with pruning, February is a good time to prune deciduous hedges before the birds start nesting. Late summer clematis can be cut back now to the lowest pair of buds to encourage new shoots and

flowers. Roses too need a good prune this month. Cut with sharp secateurs about 1/4 inch above a bud, sloping away from it to prevent water from collecting on the bud. Remove any dead or crossing stems. Remember to feed your plants once pruned to boost healthy growth. The stems on perennials that were left through the winter can now be cut back to the base. If you haven't already done so, seed potatoes should be chitted. Stand them in old egg boxes with the rose (eyes) end uppermost, in a light frost free position – a conservatory is ideal. They will be ready to plant out in March/April; Good Friday is the traditional planting day.

February is a time to enjoy snowdrops. They can be multiplied by dividing clumps "in the green" and extending the planted areas. Snowdrops do better by division now than by trying to plant dry bulbs in the autumn.

Hopefully spring will soon be upon us, so make sure you have all your seeds, pots and tools ready for busy times ahead!




